Artistic Director's Message

Why The Colored Museum?

This play scares me—in the best way. It uproots long-held truths and tropes of Black culture. It dissects the Black experience and leaves us at a powerful crossroads between pain and pride. I see myself in every character. And I felt it was important—necessary—to share that with the world. Through our fears, our hopes, our dreams, and our wounds, The Colored Museum reveals one universal truth: we are all connected by the will to survive and the desire to live a life greater than ourselves. I first worked on this play in 2016 as an Associate Artist with the African American Shakespeare Company. It was there that I truly fell in love with directing—and with this piece. That early experience planted the seed for the work you're seeing today.

What's Up With Roj?

Never did I imagine I'd be playing Roj. But the more I read the script, the more I understood—Roj is the heartbeat of this play. While each museum exhibit sheds light on a different aspect of the Black experience, Roj carries something deeper: the longing for belonging, the ache of invisibility, the search for something more.

I believe Roj represents the most under-acknowledged narrative in American society. George C. Wolfe's hands, Roj becomes a voice of connection, pain, & power.


Our Pathways and Fellowship Program

The Griot Pathways and Fellowship Program is a year-long residency designed for high school students and emerging adult artists. It combines classes, hands-on experience, and mentorship to nurture the next generation of Black and Brown theater makers. This season, four high school students and two young adults have worked behind the scenes to help shape the Griot Theater season—from creative design to production support. Our culminating June production brings their work to the stage, alongside professional Bay Area artists. This is theater as education. This is what it means to pass the torch.

The Future of Griot

We're just getting started. In six years, we've taken 28 students on a life-changing theater and education trip to New York. We've produced over 15 plays. We've provided our students with paid opportunities to gain professional experience. And now, we're offering scholarships to those who continue their journey into college. At Griot, once a student—always a student. With your support, we can grow this pipeline of Black and Brown excellence.

About the Play



The Colored Museum is a groundbreaking satirical play by George C. Wolfe that boldly examines the complexities of African American identity, culture, and history.

Premiering in 1986, the play is structured as a series of 11 exhibits in a metaphorical museum, each one spotlighting a different facet of Black life in America—from legacy and assimilation to trauma, joy, resistance, and rebirth.

Through sharp wit, biting humor, and surrealism, Wolfe confronts stereotypes and celebrates Black resilience. Characters like "Miss Roj," "The Lady in Plaid," and the iconic "Git on Board" flight attendant guide the audience through a rollercoaster of emotional and cultural experiences. Blending satire with serious reflection, The Colored Museum forces viewers to question the narratives they've inherited and invites them to reimagine what it means to be free.

Provocative, theatrical, and deeply poignant, The Colored Museum remains a powerful work of art that continues to challenge & inspire audiences decades after its debut.

George C. Wolfe




George C. Wolfe is an acclaimed American playwright, director, and producer known for his bold, imaginative, and socially impactful work in theater and film.

Born on September 23, 1954, in Frankfort, Kentucky, Wolfe rose to prominence with his satirical play The Colored Museum (1986), which critiques and celebrates African American identity through a series of theatrical "exhibits."

He later solidified his legacy as a transformative figure in American theater during his tenure as Artistic Director of The Public Theater in New York City (1993–2004), where he nurtured groundbreaking works including Bring in 'da Noise, Bring in 'da Funk.

Wolfe has directed numerous Broadway productions and films, such as Angels in America, Caroline, or Change, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, and Lackawanna Blues.

Known for blending humor, history, and activism, Wolfe has received multiple Tony Awards and remains a vital force in shaping American cultural narratives.





Holcomb is the founding artistic director of The Griot Theater Company, established to support middle school students from Martin Luther King Jr. Academy as they desegregated with the predominantly white neighboring school. Griot was created as a safe, affirming space for Black and Brown youth to explore their creativity and culture.

He holds a Master of Science in Urban Education and Social Justice with a concentration in English from the University of San Francisco, and a Bachelor of Science in Human Services and Afro-Ethnic Studies.

Holcomb has collaborated with both local and regional theater companies as a teaching artist, playwright, and performer. He believes that theater—and the arts at large—are powerful tools for healing and hope.

Luisa Espinosa

Luisa Espinosa is a recent graduate of Tamalpais High School, where she was an active member of the cheer team and a vibrant presence on campus. Originally from New York, Luisa brings a bold sense of style and a love for sports and fashion to everything she does. Since joining Griot's Pathways Program in February 2025, she has emerged as a standout leader in marketing and social media, helping to amplify the company's reach and impact. This fall, Luisa will attend Santa Barbara City College to pursue a degree in Business Administration and Finance. Her favorite aspect of working with Griot is the intergenerational spirit of the company—where she has the opportunity to learn from and collaborate with people across all ages and walks of life.

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
