

# Artistic Director's Note

Welcome to Griot. We are honored to have you with us this evening.

Six years ago, I could not have imagined this moment. What began as handwritten Post-it notes covering the walls of my apartment—ideas sketched out during lunch breaks as a classroom teacher—was meant to be nothing more than a lunch club. Today, Griot is a fully functioning nonprofit organization, sustained by a community that believes in the power of our young people and the stories they carry.

Griot Theater Company was founded in response to the desegregation mandate between Sausalito and Marin City schools. Since then, our work has grown beyond what we ever imagined. We now serve Black students across Marin County and throughout the Bay Area, exposing youth to the richness and healing power of storytelling rooted in oral traditions. Along the way, we have produced over 15 productions, taken 28 of our students to experience Broadway, and we proudly provide scholarships to Griot alumni as they transition into higher education.

Tonight's production marks an important milestone in Griot's history. For the first time, we are presenting a production under the direction of a director outside of myself. This play—conceived over 11 years ago by a fifth grader—remains a timeless and powerful work. Under the visionary leadership of our Pathways Director, Andre K. Jefferson, it has been thoughtfully reimagined and shaped for this generation of students.

We invite you to continue supporting Griot Theater Company and to learn more about the work we are doing in the community. Your presence and contributions fuel our mission and allow us to grow, dream, and expand opportunities for our youth.

We truly hope you enjoy tonight's performance and leave inspired.

# Pathways Directors Note

This piece is for us.

And by us, I mean those who have ever been excluded, discriminated against, felt left out, lost, hurt, or out of place. In other words, this story is for everyone. This is not the traditional Grinch story. This is not the familiar Grinch you may remember. Our Grinch, or rather, Grinch Jr, better yet, GJ, the son of the legend, is a normal college student trying to find his place in a new world.

This choice was important to me. I wanted to tell a story that today's youth can truly relate to, one where audiences can see themselves not only in the characters, but in the experiences woven throughout this adaptation. Another intention was to subtly explore racial prejudice and other forms of exclusion, using the color green as a visual and symbolic language. Through this lens, we examine identity, belonging, and what it means to be seen.

I invite you to listen closely to the words and sit with the simple yet profound messages within this piece. I invite you to reflect, to recognize yourself, and perhaps each other. I invite you to let the music move you, sing along to the catchy tunes, learn about Kwanzaa and its principals, and simply enjoy the show.

I hope this story sparks joy and motivates us to move with love because regardless of color, even if you're green, we're all human

Re-adapted and directed by Andre K. Jefferson.

Offers a fully realized vision of a Historically Black University in We-Ville.

Dives deeper into themes of race, identity, belonging, and discrimination.

Features original raps and songs developed collaboratively by Jefferson and the students, centering youth voice and creative leadership.
